itself. And this presence of Christ in the assembly may be the one least recognized by Catholics today. It is not stretching things to say that the tabernacle which Jesus chose as his primary dwelling place was not a metal box in a church building. His primary dwelling place is in each of us. We are each a tabernacle where he dwells.

Hospitality is reverence of Christ

Hospitality at worship, therefore, is an expression of reverence of the presence of Christ in each member of the assembly. To ignore those who gather with us to celebrate the liturgy is irreverent; it is to ignore Christ himself. To welcome them into our lives is to welcome Christ.

As we thank our present ministers of hospitality for their continued service, we invite parishioners to help grow this ministry at St. Benedict by joining the ministry.

Please review the qualities of a minister of hospitality and respond either by volunteering yourself or recommending a parishioner who is suited for the ministry. Training provided.

A minister of hospitality is a man or woman who:

- Has a gift for welcoming with genuine warmth and joy
- Is at ease with one-to-one social encounters, and can put others at ease
- Can look people in the eye and converse easily
- Has skills, knowledge, and temperament to deal with the
- Can recognize the presence of Christ in the gathering community
- Sees service in this ministry as an outgrowth of their day-to-day life as a baptized person.

St. Benedict and the Poison Cup

Did you ever wonder why there is a poison cup in the upper left corner of the stained glass window of St. Benedict in our church? An enlargement of the poison cup is featured here. This story explains the miracle of the poison cup.

St. Benedict's survival of attempted poisoning is one of the most well-known stories about his

life, and it comes from St. Gregory the Great's Dialogues, a primary source of information about St. Benedict.

While St. Benedict was living in the community he had joined after leaving his life of solitude in Subiaco, his strict adherence to the monastic rules and his ascetic way of life did not sit well with the other monks. The austerity and discipline he advocated as the prior of the community were viewed as excessively harsh by the monks who had a more relaxed interpretation of monastic living.

Feeling threatened by the changes he was instigating, the monks decided to poison him to rid themselves of his leadership. They laced his drink with poison and served it to him.

However, as was his custom, St. Benedict performed the sign of the cross over the cup before he drank from it. As he made the sign of the cross, the cup that held the poisoned drink shattered, spilling its contents. This miraculous event is interpreted as divine intervention to save St. Benedict's life.
